COMPLAINT

I, Atif Nazir, residing at **541 Manchester Ct, Piscataway, New Jersey, 08854, 732-668-4139**, (“Complainant”) request the School Ethics Commission to consider a complaint against the above-named Respondent whose home address is **37 Summershade Circle, Piscataway, New Jersey, 08854**, in accordance with the authority of the School Ethics Commission to entertain such complaints under N.J.S.A. 18A:12-21 et seq.

The facts upon which this complaint is based are as follows:

1. Statement of facts:

(1) On May 19th, 2019, a campaign flyer (Exhibit A) was circulated in Piscataway, New Jersey, asking recipients to vote for the candidates in the 2019 Democratic Primary election bracketed together in Column B under the slogan “Middlesex County Democratic Organization.” The flyer appeared to be left only at the homes of voters of likely Indian descent. The flyer featured an Indian flag and contained a letter (the “Letter”) from Kapil Shah, a Piscataway Township Councilman, Nitang Patel (“Respondent”), a member of the Piscataway Township Board of Education, and Kalpesh Patel, a member of the Piscataway Township Zoning Board. The Letter read, in part:

Dear Friend,

We have a special relationship with the Piscataway Democrats. They have appointed South Asians to Piscataway Boards and Commissions. They have worked with our community to build cricket fields. They participate in our events, including our flag hosting on India Independence Day at the Piscataway Senior Center and in Navarati and Diwali at the Gayatri Temple. Most importantly, they have promoted South Asians to positions of leadership.

In November of 2016, Kapil Shah was elected the first Indian-American to serve on our Piscataway Township Council. **Now Piscataway Democrats need our help. They are being challenged by a radical group under the leadership of Atif Nazir that wants to take over our township government. We cannot let this happen.** (emphasis added)

(2) The back of the flyer contained a translation of the Letter into Gujarati.

(3) The Letter is signed by Kapil Shah, Nitang Patel, and Kalpesh Patel, with a picture of each individual below their signatures. The name of each signer is followed by their title. In the case of Nitang Patel, his name is followed by the words "Board of Education." The bottom of the flyer identifies the Piscataway Democratic Organization with the words "Like us on Facebook at Piscataway Democratic Organization." The bottom of the flyer also contains paid for by language assertion that it was "Paid for by The Election Fund of Senator Bob Smith." Senator Smith is a New Jersey State Senator representing Legislative District 17.

(4) The Letter is signed by and contains a picture of Respondent, and identifies him as "Nitant Patel, Board of Education." Nowhere on the flyer is it made clear that Respondent is speaking as a private citizen and not as a member of the Board or on behalf of the entire Board.

(5) Complainant is a well-known member of the Muslim community in Piscataway. Complainant does not currently hold any public office. Complainant does not hold an officer position in any group running candidates in the Democratic Primary election of June 4, 2019. Complainant is not a candidate in the 2019 Democratic Primary election of June 4, 2019.

Date of occurrence May 19, 2019

I assert this to be a violation of: N.J.S.A. 18A:12-21 et seq., N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e)

(6) N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e) provides: "I will recognize that authority rests with the board of education and will make no personal promises nor take any private action that may compromise the board"

(7) In its Advisory Opinion A03-07 of the School Ethics Commission of April 2, 2007, the Commission, citing N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e), advised:

The Commission also reconsidered its advice in A02-06 that a board member should not hold her or himself out as a board member in a letter to the editor. After considerable deliberation, the Commission agrees that a board member should identify her or his title as a board member if she or he writes a letter to the editor. However, the board member must also indicate in the letter that it is neither authorized by nor written on behalf of the board. Therefore, the Commission advises that, if you wish to write a letter to the editor, you must

identify yourself as a board member, but you must also indicate that the letter is not authorized by the board and that the letter is not written on behalf of the board. The information in the letter must not contain confidential information and it must be accurate. Last, you must ensure that your private action does not compromise the board.

(8) Similarly, in its Advisory Opinion 36-14 of the School Ethics Commission of October 29, 2014, the Commission advised:

You have inquired whether it would be a violation of the School Ethics Act (Act), N.J.S.A. 18A:12-21 et seq., for you to endorse candidates for election to the Board, and if allowed, would there be limitations on your use of lawn signs, publications such as pamphlets, social media, and the potential need for disclaimers in issuing endorsements. The Commission has determined that there would be no violation of the Act for you to express yourself politically as a private citizen with regard to the endorsement of candidates in any election. You do not give up your fundamental rights as a citizen upon being seated on a board of education. However, as you suspect in your inquiry, certain precautions are necessary.

With regard to any pamphlets or other publications you may create, you must include a disclaimer, making it clear that your endorsement is as a private citizen and not as a member of the Board or on behalf of the entire Board...

Finally, you inquired about suggested language to use in a disclaimer for potential publications, pamphlets or on social media. The Commission will defer to your discretion on the exact wording of any such disclaimer, but suggests the language must be clear, visible, and indicate your endorsement is as a private citizen and not as a member of the Local Board of Education nor is the endorsement on behalf of the entire Board.

(9) On the campaign flyer that was distributed, Respondent was identified as "Nitang Patel, Board of Education" as a signatory to the letter contained in the flyer. Nowhere on the flyer does it state that he is writing as a private citizen and not as a member of the Local Board of Education, nor does it state that the letter is not authorized by nor written on behalf of the board. Further, by identifying himself as "Nitang Patel, Board of Education" he creates the impression that he is in fact writing on behalf of the whole Board. For these reasons he is in violation of N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e) pursuant to the Advisory Opinions of the Schools Ethics Commission referenced above.

2. Statement of facts:

The facts expressed in Paragraphs 1 through 9 above are incorporated by reference herein as if fully set forth herein.

Date of occurrence: May 19, 2019.

I assert this to be a violation of: N.J.S.A. 18A:12-21 et seq., N.J.S.A.18A:12-24.1(g) and N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e).

(10) N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(g) provides:

I will hold confidential all matters pertaining to the schools which, if disclosed, would needlessly injure individuals or the schools. In all other matters, I will provide accurate information and, in concert with my fellow board members, interpret to the staff the aspirations of the community for its school.

(11) The statute provides that a member of a Board of Education will “provide accurate information” “in all other matters.” In doing so, it holds a member of a Board of Education to a higher standard than a member of the general public with regard to the accuracy of information provided by the member. In the case of the flyer in question, at the time of its writing and distribution Respondent knew or reasonably should have known that Complainant, (a) does not currently hold any public office, and (b) does not hold an officer position in any group running candidates in the Democratic Primary election of June 4, 2019, and (c) is not a candidate in the 2019 Democratic Primary election of June 4, 2019.

(12) As a result, the statements contained in the Letter that the Piscataway Democrats “are being challenged by a radical group under the leadership of Atif Nazir that wants to take over our township government” are willfully false and misleading in two respects: (a) Atif Nazir holds no “leadership” role in any association or faction of candidates running in the June 4, 2019 primary election; and (b) the group of candidates running is not “radical.” These factual misstatements are a violation of N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(g).

(13) Further, the assertion that Complainant is the leader of a “radical group” which seeks to “take over our township government” is a violation of N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e).

(14) N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e) provides: “I will recognize that authority rests with the board of education and will make no personal promises nor take any private action that may compromise the board.”

(15) While it could be argued that the assertion that Complainant is the leader of a “radical group” which seeks to “take over our township government” is an expression of opinion, and therefore protected free speech, it is well-established that there are limits to the free speech rights of board of education members. For example, in the matter of Susan Dunbar Bey v Sean Brown, Camden Board of Education, Camden County, Docket No. C25-11 before the School Ethics Commission (Decision mailing date: December 21, 2011), the Commission wrote:

...The Commission disagrees. While it recognizes the respondent’s right to express his difference of opinion with the Board and the administration, it must also find, under these circumstances, that the respondent’s chosen method and manner for doing so was inappropriate. Comparing the Superintendent to a terrorist, on a social media outlet which allowed for access by many people, was an intentionally confrontational act. In this connection, the Commission acknowledges the complainant’s observation that members of the community assume that Board members have insight that others do not have. Thus, when a

sitting Board member makes such a judgmental proclamation, it is likely to be credited far more than a statement offered by an ordinary citizen.”

(16) The Commission recognizes that while a Board member has a right to express their opinion, the “method and manner” in which a Board member chooses to express him or herself is of consequence. N.J.S.A. 18A:12-22(a) reminds us that it is “essential that the conduct of members of local boards of education and local school administrators hold the respect and confidence of the people.” The expression of opinion in a method and manner that undermines that respect and confidence of the people in the Board member and/or the Board of Education compromises the Board, in violation of N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e).

(17) The statement contained in the Letter that the Piscataway Democrats “are being challenged by a radical group under the leadership of Atif Nazir that wants to take over our township government” is an example of just such a method and manner of expressing an opinion that will tend to undermine the respect and confidence of the people and compromise the Board. The words need to be seen in their overall context. At the time of the writing and distribution of this flyer, Respondent knew or reasonably should have known that Complainant:

(a) does not currently hold any public office;

(b) does not hold an officer position in any group running candidates in the Democratic Primary election of June 4, 2019;

(c) is not a candidate in the 2019 Democratic Primary election of June 4, 2019; and

(d) is a well-known member of the Muslim community in Piscataway.

(18) Additionally, Respondent knew or reasonably should have known that:

(a) there are a substantial number of people of Indian descent residing in Piscataway;

(b) there are a substantial number of people of Pakistani descent residing in Piscataway;

(c) there are a substantial number of adherents to the Hindu religion in Piscataway;

(d) there are a substantial number of adherents to the Muslim religion in Piscataway;

(e) there is a history of conflict between the countries of India and Pakistan;

(f) that this conflict has often resulted in tension between the Indian and Pakistani, and Hindu and Muslim communities, and

(g) in the current political climate, referring to a member of the Muslim community as “radical” or claiming that a Muslim man is the leader of a “radical group that wants to take over the government” is intentionally inflammatory language.

(19) The language contained in the Letter provoked immediate public condemnation, including an editorial by the Star Ledger Editorial Board (Exhibit B) and an online petition that quickly garnered over 300 signatures, including many from elected officials and prominent members of the Muslim community (Exhibit C).

(20) One can reasonably ask what reason Respondent could have had for singling out a man of Muslim descent as the leader of a “radical group” when Respondent had no basis in fact for either assertion. One could also ask what reason Respondent could have for limiting distribution of the Letter to members of the Indian community. In the absence of alternative explanation, it appears that the Letter was intentionally written and targeted to provoke fear of the Muslim community in Piscataway and to incite acrimony between the Muslim and Hindu communities for the purpose of assisting the candidates of Column B in their electoral efforts by encouraging Indian members of the community to vote for them because, as the Letter states in reference to Atif Nazir “taking control of the government,” “We cannot let that happen.”

(21) Respondent’s manner and method of expression in the Letter was intentionally inflammatory and can only have the result of causing division and undermining relations between the Muslim and Hindu communities in Piscataway, a town that prides itself on its diversity. Consequently, it undermines the “respect and confidence of the people” in the Respondent and the Piscataway Township Board of Education, and therefore “compromises the Board” in violation of N.J.S.A. 18A:12-24.1(e).

WHEREFORE, I, as Complainant, request that the School Ethics Commission find and determine that the above-named Respondent(s) has violated the School Ethics Act and that he or she be subject to such penalty as provided by the Act.

Anti-Muslim memes have no place in our politics | Editorial

There is a flyer circulating among voters in Piscataway that uses the kind of coded anti-Muslim language that makes most of us uneasy.

The bigger problem is that the person who funded the flyer — powerful state Senator Bob Smith, the Middlesex Democrat — doesn't see the necessity to repudiate it or apologize for it.

The flyer was targeted to predominantly Indian-American households and translated into Gujarati, a growing diaspora throughout the county that is primarily of Hindu faith.

Given the perpetual tensions and violence in India between Hindus and Muslims, the coded language seems suspicious. And given that Islam has become the religion most often targeted for demonization by people who occupy the White House and the global surge in [anti-Muslim propaganda](#), language matters.

The flyer is signed by three prominent Indian-American residents — none of them [Muslim](#) — promoting candidates who are running in the primary for County Committee next week under Smith's banner, the Middlesex County Democratic Organization.

The language used against their opponents from the Central Jersey Progressive Democrats is unambiguous: Naming an outspoken and admired Muslim school board member, the MCDO called the opposing slate "a radical group under the leadership of Atif Nazir that wants to take over our township government. We cannot let that happen."

In two other places, Smith's candidates ask the reader to vote for "the REAL DEMOCRATS" on primary day.

It's unclear how this is being received in the targeted homes, but it sounds like [dog-whistle stuff](#).

For starters, Nazir isn't running for anything, and it isn't his party. The CJPD was founded by a group led by Staci Berger, a candidate for county committee. Odd how they singled him out.

Secondly, associating Islam with any form of radicalization is a tool commonly used by fear-mongering pea-wits.

So we can't disagree with Jim Sues, the executive director of the New Jersey chapter of the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR-NJ), who says, "It's a shame to see the local Democratic party using the tactics of the far right: exploiting stereotype-based fears to divide and conquer. They've decided to exchange a short term political gain for a divided, distrusting community."

Dr. Muhammad Ali Chaudry, the former mayor of Bernards Township and the president of the Islamic Society of Basking Ridge, was more blunt.

"Disgraceful," he called it. "The use of the word 'radical' is absolutely inappropriate. You can oppose their ideas, but to use such a term violates the spirit of the political process, where everyone has a right to present themselves for political office."

More infuriating to Dr. Chaudry is that the [Hindu-Muslim conflict](#) that has roiled the world's largest democracy "is not really an issue here in New Jersey. If you come to any of the interfaith events we hold, you would know that. Bob Smith should know that."

Smith concedes one point: "The only thing that could have been (said) better is that Nazir is a member of a 'radical party,'" the Senator said. "Because they are radical, they're about 100 degrees to the left of Bernie Sanders."

Asked for specific examples of the CJPD's radicalism, he replied, "The one I remember, they are 100 percent for Bernie Sanders."

Actually, if Smith's own party has learned anything since 2015, it's that Sanders' positions on income inequality, the corruption of politics by corporate money, student debt, minimum wage, Wall Street regulation, affordable health care, and climate change action – once dismissed as idealistic — are now mainstream.

For some, however, it's easier to communicate in political pejoratives, such as slapping the word "radical" on a household flyer.

It's facile, and it's beneath him. The Senator should apologize.

Over 300 Elected Officials, Organizational Leaders and NJ Residents Condemn Sen. Bob Smith's and Piscataway Democrats' Anti-Muslim Flyer and Call for a Public Apology

Piscataway NJ – In the wake of yesterday's [Star Ledger editorial](#) calling on State Senator Bob Smith to apologize for an Anti-Muslim flyer he funded in his hometown of Piscataway, and which was circulated by the wife of Piscataway Mayor Brian Wahler, more than 300 people have signed on to a public statement condemning the hateful flyer and echoing the call for an apology.

Signed by Montgomery Mayor Sadaf Jaffer, the first female Muslim mayor in NJ, Hazim Yassi, Councilman, Borough of Red Bank, members of the Middlesex County Democratic Organization and other elected officials, as well as leaders of CAIR, Young Muslims, NJ Citizen Action, Action Together New Jersey, NJ Working Families Alliance, Our Revolution New Jersey, area progressive organizations and hundreds of residents from around the state, the statement reads:

"As public leaders, members and supporters of a wide array of faith-based, community and progressive organizations, and residents of our diverse state, we stand in opposition to the hateful election flyer distributed in Piscataway, which called Dr. Atif Nazir 'the leader of a radical group trying to take over our local government.'

It is a deep betrayal of public responsibility that the flyer was signed by office holders Kapil Shah, Nitang Patel and Kalpesh Patel; paid for by the Election Fund of Sen. Bob Smith; and circulated by the wife of Mayor Brian Wahler. It was targeted to Indian-Americans and translated into Gujarati to target that voting bloc. This was a dog-whistle attack, coded to stir fear and division against the Muslim community in Piscataway, where Dr. Nazir has served as a school board member. It is an attempt to divide the South Asian community along religious, ethnic and national lines. It is also an effort to smear everyone who is standing up for an open electoral process.

We condemn the use of these divisive and truly shameful tactics, which we see on a daily basis in our national political dialogue. We stand in solidarity with Dr. Nazir and all of Piscataway, which is the seventh most diverse community in New Jersey. We will not be silent while this kind of fear-mongering and intolerance is being used to divide people. We call on all of those involved to retract this statement publicly and to apologize publicly to Dr. Nazir and to the entire Piscataway community.

“Despite widespread, growing opposition to and concern about this flyer, Sen. Smith, Municipal Chairman Ted Light, Mayor Brain Wahler and his wife, the elected officials who signed the letter and the rest of the Piscataway Democratic Organization have not apologized.
