Democrats this year held onto a 25-15 majority in the state senate, while the assembly went from 46-34 to 51-29 Democrats. State Senator Sam Thompson (D-30), who retired this year, surrendered a Democratic seat to the GOP on Nov. 7. Election Day, but former Assemblyman John Burzichelli (D-3) made up that loss with his win over Republican state Senator Ed Durr (R-3).

Senate President Nick Scutari (D-22) probably wasn't overjoyed that

South Jersey Democrats showed some resurgence behind wins by Burzichelli and Paul Moriarty (D-4). But the senate president rattled off any Republican threat to his upper house party majority, most significantly on the strength of his backing by the Middlesex County Democratic Committee, and Middlesex's strong alliance with Essex and North Jersey.

Middlesex's Speaker Craig Coughlin (D-19) made history this year as

a fourth term speaker of New Jersey's General Assembly (for more on that, please see the entry on Middlesex County Democratic Committee Chairman Kevin McCabe, below).

All in all, a dominant year for New Jersey Democrats in control of the Legislature, behind their dual message of fortifying abortion rights and the StayNJ plan, engineered to make life more affordable for cash-strapped senior citizens.

How long will it take for them to implode?

As long as the multiply indicted former President Donald J. Trump hangs around, will it matter?

Which of the parties implodes most catastrophically?


The year 2024 will prove extraordinary, no doubt, as – presumably – GOP frontrunner Trump goes up against his conqueror, President Joe Biden, a Democrat, and New Jersey, always a fundraising cash cow, looks to play on the bigger, national stage. 

1. LeRoy Jones

Democratic State Party Chairman Essex County Democratic Chairman



The murky nature of New Jersey politics can make the job of Democratic Party State chair a pretty thankless one, as the various Flash Gordon fiefdoms seek to blame the power on the throne for their own woes. But this election year gave little room to the naysayers, as Democrats mopped up, and Jones – targeted by his enemies in the lead-up – rightly basked in the glow of success. All the leveled body blows administered by Jones to the GOP (and to re-

gional warlords woozy from his willingness to trade shots) fades now in advance of 2024, the toughest test for the Democratic leader, as his party seeks to retain the presidency in the face of a flaming asteroid-out-of-control candidacy of Donald J. Trump. Barring a significant shift in GOP strategy (and casting selection) Jones figures to win here in his home state, of course, but look for the chairman to seek an extension of his influence, especially into neigh-

boring battleground Pennsylvania. Remember, Jones derives his stature from stacking totem poles of political power, starting with what he built as chairman of the East Orange Democratic Party, a position he still maintains, sandwiching Essex chair between that and his duties as leader of the state party. Now, heading into a presidential contest, he looks to launch a national-sized rocket off a sturdy NJ political Mayan temple of his own making.

2. Kevin McCabe

Middlesex County Democratic Committee Chairman



No other chair went to war this year this year like McCabe, taking a Dublin GPO mentality into the trenches of legislative races and letting anyone connected to him know that he refused to give ground. He didn't. If no one could have predicted Senator Sam Thompson's defection from the GOP, surely Avi Schnall acrobatics into the LD-30 assembly seat caught by surprise those not paying attention to the back dramas of Democratic Party persuasion and opportunism. At the very least, Middlesex needed to corral Vin Gopal, Andrew Zwicker and Linda Greenstein back into office, while maintaining

his Vitale-Diegnan-Smith core, which McCabe did, with an exclamation point. As chatter abounded in the leadup to election day about collapsing structures, the Middlesex Democratic chair also played a critical role in ensuring the victories of all those battleground party slates. The chairman's performance secured the leadership of Speaker Craig Coughlin (McCabe's political ward, making history as a fourth-term speaker) and Senate President Nick Scutari (whose survival depends on McCabe's chain link umbilical cord). Lest anyone forget, no one else in the state brings the atmospherics of Celtic chieftain

to the role of chairman quite like McCabe. Less William Wallace face paint, more ruthless decorous attention to political detail, McCabe employs real-time tactics while demonstrating Connor MacLeod perseverance in an old school orbit that includes former chair John Lynch. The ultimate Trenton gamesman, whose election year tactics included frontend-loading the StayNJ argument to muzzle budget critics, McCabe also relies on the politically magnetic Gary Taffat, a critical whisperer in the ear of power, insurance broker and former chief-of-staff to then-Governor James McGreevey.

3. Matt Platkin

New Jersey Attorney General



Boy Wonder to Phil Murphy's Batman, Platkin took a hiatus from state government in time for the Murphy Administration to offload Gurbir Grewal, who offended key players in the Murphy political orbit.

Platkin returned, certainly not as an unoffending, Murphy luggage-lugging Igor (most people peg him as the smartest man in state government) but because the early kitchen cabinet player (and COVID-19 era counsel) earned the governor's rough weather trust. Indeed, when Murphy unveiled his choice as New Jersey's next attorney general earlier this year, Murphy appeared positively giddy.

4. Tammy Murphy

First Lady of New Jersey



The alleged corruption meltdown of Bob Menendez provided the perfect starters' gun pistol crack for an eye-of-the-tiger TM to race out of the blocks in hungry pursuit of the family's next political goal. This time, it will be the first lady as the candidate, as the Murphys rally around the party for 2024 support toward her United States senate candidacy. The charred remains of Menendez's political life left at least a blueprint for Phil Murphy to rummage out of the ashes, namely how to use political office to propel a family member into power. Menendez did it for his son, serving as the 8th District congressman, and now the governor will exercise his influence to augment his wife, while extending his own political life. In a way, nothing's really changed. It's still all in the family. Simultaneously, as Gov-

ernor Murphy segues to fulltime presidential possibility, Tammy Murphy will be there with an ever upwardly mobile guiding hand. But can they pull off president and U.S. Senate on the same timeline? Even the Clintons had to stagger their political hula hoops over time, but maybe times have changed. And they never had the immediate inspiration of a New Jersey political template.

5. Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti

Chief-of-Staff for Governor Phil Murphy





7. Charlie Wowkanech

President of the New Jersey AFL-CIO



A second-generation member of International Union of Operating Engineers Local 68, Wowkanech worked on a start-

up crew at Newark airport at the start of his long career. Elected AFL-CIO President in 1997, he leads an organization that serves one million members, and jumps onto the front lines of real labor issues, like the nurses' strike at RWJ Barnabas.

8. Bill Mullen

President of the New Jersey Building Trades Council



Senate President Steve Sweeney (D-3) went down in 2021, but his close friend Mullen still wields considerable power – and wisdom. "Don't get involved in special interest causes," he told his members in Atlantic City

ahead of Election Day that same year, as the fragged Democratic Party – ill served by its barge loads of pattycake playing insiders - failed to hammer out a mature, relevant, and convincing message for voters. Apparently, Democrats got the message, and Speaker Craig Coughlin this year advanced the StayNJ plan (over the initial objection of the governor) to directly address New Jersey affordability issues for seniors.

9. Fran Ehret

New Jersey State Director for the Communications Workers of America, District 1



Leader of one of the most powerful unions in the state, former toll collector Ehret stands at the head of an organization that represents more than 70,000 working families in the Garden State – including 40,000 state workers, 15,000 county and mu-

nicipal workers, and thousands of workers in the telecommunications, airlines, health care, and direct care industries.

10. Paul Juliano

Bergen County Democratic Committee Chairman



Unlike other counties that would never feel the impact of red wave weather, Juliano actually had to sweat it out a little this year in a big, complex county where Republicans never operate entirely out of the running. Primarily tasked with ensuring the reelection of his commissioners and LD-36 incumbent state Senator Joe Lagana, Juliano accomplished both, and did so without a lot of fanfare. The LD-36 race, in particular, caused

some late-in-the-game palpitations. Democrats fumbled away Paramus a few years ago, so any race in which Paramus figures into the final outcome presents legitimate challenges. Juliano escaped the embarrassment of losing an assembly seat (that wouldn't have looked good with South Jersey mildly resurgent and Middlesex running the table), and occupies a strong position ahead of back-to-back statewide election years. Part of

his power will hinge perhaps on what U.S. Rep. Josh Gottheimer (D-5) intends as part of his political future. Right now, it looks like Gottheimer wants to be the next governor, which will put Juliano on a Democratic Party collision course with LeRoy Jones, who backs U.S. Rep. Mikie Sherrill (D-11) to succeed Murphy. How will they decide that pre-primary contest? McCabe might have something to say on that front. Others, too.

11. Bill Castner

Partner, Connell Foley

12. Dale Florio

The President and CEO of Princeton Public Affairs Group




David Carradine look-alike Florio possesses a calm, in-control and results-driven demeanor, which makes him stand out as a stoic in a state so often conditioned by hyperactivity – and little progress. A longtime Somerset County ally of statewide candidate Jack Ciattarelli, Florio played a critical inner circle 2021 role in rebuilding

the GOP in the aftermath of Trump's Godzilla-like ravaging of the party, only to watch it torched, torn down and ravaged again. Really, it must be a little tough to be the ex-party boss version of Florio, kind of like Sting having to sit in a tux and listen to Jose Feliciano sing "Every Breath You Take" onstage. Schooled by the late,

great Millicent Fenwick, Florio must listen to the greatest hits of his party reimagined as parental notifications. It's akin to him knowing and understanding Gibbons' treatment of the Romans, then being forced to realize it reenacted as a Leroy Neiman painting. At least he's got Ciattarelli running in 2025 – and a booming business.

13. George Norcross

South Jersey Democratic Party Power Broker



The Democratic Party Power Broker had a great 20-year run, expanding his empire in South Jersey while northern counties killed one another with excessive individual egos run amok. If Norcross himself suffered from hubris, that quality prevented anyone else in his orbit from playing the role of Caesar, and it helped him expand power. The 2021 election truly ran his chariot into the ditch, though, as three straight years

of incremental losses contained the last and most injurious, when Steve Sweeney fell spectacularly from power, setting Norcross up as the Democrats' number one Eagles tailgate party organizer. His organization submerged deeper into red ebb last year as Cumberland went to the GOP. Two critical wins this year, though (LD-3 and LD-4), have him back in the game, ready once again to reassume imperial command.

His critics say not so fast, pointing out that he's holding serve (Norcross is a tennis fan) with the LD-4 seat, and laugh at the fact that Sweeney lost in the first place because the organization forgot the first rule of politics, courtesy of Tip O'Neill. Of course, Norcross is going to try to soliloquize at the center of the stage again, humbly playing his part as a victimized emperor hauling himself out of the wilderness.

14. Middy Baraka

Chief of staff to Mayor Ras Baraka



The so-called Bobby Kennedy of Baraka world will turn his attention statewide as the mayor lays the groundwork for a 2025 gubernatorial bid. This should be interesting. Middy is used to smacking people around in Newark, not literally, but figuratively. They rule the roost

over there, the Baraka brothers. Now, will they be able to do that statewide, off-the-line? Good question. They arrive at the dance less than politically polished after a few years of uncompetitive citywide elections. Maybe that's not entirely fair. They were noncompetitive be-

cause Ras (and certainly Middy) deftly headed off any potential problems prior to each election season. Keep in mind, too, that they vaulted into city hall as leaders of the new rebellion, so they have a history of occupying the outside land and suddenly cutting inside.

15. Peg Schaffer

Somerset County Democratic Committee Chair Vice Chair of the Democratic State Committee



Union County native Schaffer lives and breathes politics, unlike those who use politics as a metaphor for a former life of high school sports. This is real – and real time - for the hardnosed chair, who had another good year this year, on the

strength of wins by commissioners Doug Singeterry and Paul Drake. Democrats have cemented power in Somerset, where the GOP must obediently run for cover in the county seat where former President Donald J. Trump likes to routinely go



16. Pat Colligan

President, New Jersey State Police Benevolent Association (NJPBA)



A veteran of Franklin Township Local 154, the PBA Prez oversees the labor organizing activities of more 33,000 officers in the State of New Jersey. As of press time, the House could be decided by crime in NYC, where five incumbent Democrats from Long Island through the Central Valley could go down. That outcome reasserts the political role of cops in a significant way.



17. Jack Ciattarelli

2021 Republican candidate for Governor



In a state with one million more registered Democrats than Republicans, the statewide GOP pizza parlor and bowling alley hopper from Hillsborough – a former assemblyman came within three percentage points of dethroning Democratic incumbent Governor Murphy. His secret to success? He spoke plain English to the people. He's running again, and no less

engaged. Tan, fit, substantive, aware of the issues that real New Jerseyans grapple with, and ready for action, you'll see him soon, no doubt, at a political event near you.

18. Al Gaburo

Lobbyist, Princeton Public Affairs Group



The former chairman of the Somerset County GOP continues to prove a capable ally of his long-time friend – and fellow Raritan Borough product – Republican nominee Jack Ciattarelli, who kept a brisk 2023 schedule in advance of the next statewide Republican primary.

19. George Gilmore

Ocean County GOP Chairman



If Gilmore's life were a movie, it would be titled, "The Man who would be Pardoned by the King." But it might have been different. It could have even starred Sean Connery at one point, or at least Cliff Robertson. Pardoned by then-President Trump after getting jammed up on tax evasion charges, Vivaldi-loving kingmaker Gilmore returned - by the skin of his teeth - to the chairmanship he wielded for over two decades in New Jersey's biggest Republican county. Looking to return to his Genghis Khan glory days as the state's premier GOP boss, Gilmore will have to contend with considerable fracturing in the party. The fact that Trump pardoned him gives you some idea of where his loyalties lie. He did ok this year, but suffered the embarrassment of a Democratic Party assembly sniping in LD-30.


20. Joseph Tobin

Cardinal, Archdiocese of Newark



Six years on the job as the senior-most Catholic cleric in New Jersey, Cardinal Tobin received critical appointments by Pope Francis as a member of the Joint International Commission for Theological Dialogue between the Catholic Church and the Orthodox Church, Congregation

for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life, Synod of Bishops, Congregation for Catholic Education, Pontifical Council for Culture, Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity, Council for the Economy, and Congregation for Bishops. Political, he famously walked the Chamber of Commerce Train to Washington, D.C. in the first year of his installment, and got down with New Jersey's elected officials and assorted Trenton chattering classes. In addition, the cardinal has rock star Bishop James Checcio backing him up in the Diocese of Metuchen.



















21. Angelo Genova


Partner, Genova Burns LLC



You don't want to be caught on the opposing side of power attorney Genova with the judge's gavel dropping. Just ask the legal team of Steve Rothman, which in 2012 found itself blandly teleconferencing in to a rainy pre-Election Day Passaic County courtroom where Genova showed up in person looking like a U.S. Marine ready to storm Normandy Beach. Powerhouse in his own right Paj Parikh, election law expert, serves as a key figure in the Genova empire.

22. Greg Lalevee

Business Manager, International Union of Operating Engineers Local 825



Started working as a crane operator in 1984, elected business manager of the 7K-strong men and women in 2010. Maintains strong political ties around the state of New Jersey; prevailed on Governor Murphy to include roads and bridges in PLA agreements totaling over \$5 million, a boon to his union. His members this year began to work on those long-term projects created by President Joe Biden's federal infrastructure act, including the Gateway Tunnel; and the Portal Bridge.

23. Michele Siekerka


President and CEO of the New Jersey Business and Industry Association



A routine critic of Governor Phil Murphy, Siekerka champions what she calls an economic plan seen through the lens of regional competitiveness and affordability. Through the COVID crisis, Siekerka – like Tom Bracken – served as that voice of clarity on the economic engine front, pressuring Murphy not to lose sight of suffering New Jersey businesses. In an election year, with the interests of suffering businesses on the ballot, Siekerka proved to have had not only her ear to the ground – but her voice leading a choir of resistance.

24. Tom Bracken

President of the NJ Chamber of Commerce



Bracken (along with Siekerka) remains the state's leading business advocate, and proponent of a stronger state economy through implementation of the Chamber's Plan for an Affordable New Jersey. As politics devolves into pitched tribal camps of general wretchedness, Bracken offers that Tom Kean Sr.-era school gravitas that most people are starved for, without even knowing what they lack.

25. John Currie

Passaic County Democratic Committee Chairman



The Passaic County party icon had a tough couple of years, before rectifying some countywide bleeding (it appeared, at least, at press time), with close countywide wins in another tight election year. He lost commission seats in the 2021

Ciattarelli swamping, then appeared sidelined as party members rushed to install the next senate president. Probably the most significant thing to watch with Currie is the developing situation around CD-9, where veteran U.S. Rep. Bill Pascrell

appears poised to retire after a long and distinguished career. Sources point to Paterson Mayor Andre Sayegh as Pascrell's most likely successor, but it could get complicated. That's kind of where Currie thrives.


Chief-of-Staff Essex County Executive Joe Divincenzo

Represents over 7500 New Jersey Transit workers, and over 30,000 between New York and New Jersey.

Hamm isn't so much a permanently public unreconstructed rebel as he is a defender of the republic for – of all things – the actual public. Having learned his trade on the streets of his native Newark during the 1967 troubles, Hamm shows no signs of slowing down. If anything, he's more active now than ever. An unsuccessful candidate for the U.S. Senate in 2021, Hamm is running again, presumably in a Democratic Primary against First Lady Tammy Murphy and U.S. Rep. Andy Kim (D-3).

When Platkin left the Murphy Administration two years ago (only to later return to become the state's new Attorney General, see above), Garg stepped up to become the governor's new chief counsel. President of BlueWaveNJ







CEO of the Zita Group, the veteran Zita learned her trade in the Speaker Doria era and has emerged as one of the most powerful women in Trenton as head of a full-scale lobbying firm that includes stars like Jeannine LaRue (see below) and Christie Administration veteran Chris Hughes.

An old school reporter from Union City, Snowflack has stellar credentials as a former reporter and editor for the Daily Record and Bergen-Record and veteran InsiderNJ columnist. Now currently engaged in a fight to unionize condo workers.





President, Health Professional Allied Employees (HPAE)




