METHODOLOGY

The survey was sponsored by *Insider NJ* and conducted by StimSight Research from May 7-10, 2025 with a probability sample of 409 likely voters in the New Jersey Democratic primary drawn from a list of voters who have participated in at least one primary election in the past four cycles. Interviews were conducted in English and included both self-administered online surveys via a text-to-web invitation link and live telephone interviews. Voters saw/heard the candidate list for the vote choice question in the order the names appear on the ballot for their registered county; online participants also saw each candidate's ballot slogan below the name. The full sample is weighted for region, age, gender, and race based on the probabilistic demographic composition of the likely primary electorate in line with prior New Jersey primary turnout. The sampling margin of error for this poll is ±4.9 percentage points.

Race: 59% White non-Hispanic, 20% Black, 16% Hispanic, 5% Asian, other

Education: 15% high school or less, 25% some college, 33% BA/BS degree, 27% graduate degree

Income: 46% under \$100,000, 35% \$100-199,000, 19%, \$200,000 or more

Union household: 32% yes

Public employee household: 36% yes

Region: 14% Northeast, 20% Urban Core, 19% Route 1 Corridor, 11% Central Hills, 9% Northern Shore,

19% Delaware Valley, 8% Garden Core
